## **Moving Energy Products: Risks & Rewards**

The ability to increase & diversify exports of Canada's energy resources is both a significant opportunity and a controversial issue. In the face of rising global opposition and awareness that perception is often reality – a frank discussion of the risks and reward of energy developments and transportation is needed. WESTAC will explore the subject in a balanced fashion, allowing both proponents and opponents to explain their views.

Members will have the opportunity to have a dialogue on this important issue in an in-camera setting.

Speakers will discuss:

**Pipeline and oil sands developments.** Overview of the announced pipeline projects and update on oil sands developments.

**Economics.** The impacts of pipelines & oil sands expansion on jobs, taxes and royalty revenues (and the impact of a 'no expansion' scenario). The impacts on Canadian businesses and on the business of transportation. Other options to create economic prosperity.

**Marine safety record & measures.** Canada has decades of experience in transporting oil via pipelines and tankers. The safety record to date in transporting oil to the West and East coasts and beyond; safety measures in place for the future (ship design, operation & navigation).

**Rail as a transportation option.** The potential for using rail as an alternative to pipeline development. The economics, the benefits and drawbacks.

**Environment & community impacts.** The impact on communities, rivers & coastlines. The economic and environmental impacts on First Nations' traditional territories.
